MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE

CHAIRMAN The Lord Norrie *

Lord Norrie has been President of BTCV since 1987 and has had a distinguished career in the House of Lords promoting conservation interests. He is a former winner of the House of Lords Green Ribbon political award for Services to the Environment.

Member Jane Stevensen *

Jane has been a Trustee of BTCV since December 2008. Originally an exploration geologist for the international oil and gas sector, she is a highly experienced corporate strategy advisor in sustainability, environmental and business policy, and a specialist in the development of sustainability programmes and partnerships for business and the not-for-profit sector. She is currently working with Barclays Global through the Banking Industry Environment Initiative as Iconic Projects Coordination Advisor, on the identification and coordination of appropriate investment opportunities for major environmental projects. She is a member of the Cambridge Network for Global Sustainability Leadership and the INSEAD Executive Sustainability Roundtable

Member Robert C Morley

Rob Morley is the Senior Member of the Council of the National Trust, and chairs their Nominations Committee for the appointment of trustees. He is also a trustee of the Land Trust and the Stowe House Preservation Trust. One of the first volunteers for the Conservation Corps, Rob was Chief Executive of BTCV 1987-1993, and is now a Vice-President.

Member Dr Rupert Evenett

Dr Evenett has held senior roles in each of the private, public and civil society sectors. He was Chair of BTCV from 2006 to 2011 and is currently a non-executive director of The Social Investment Business, a member of the Council of Goldsmiths, University of London and Governor of Christ the King Sixth Form College. He is the author of "Making Good in Social Impact Investment" (2011) and has chaired and contributed to a number of other reviews relating to the civil society sector. Previously he had a 20 year career in corporate finance, retiring after the birth of his first child, latterly at Merrill Lynch. In his last five years up to 2003 he fundraised £10 billion for corporate clients and advised on corporate transactions worth £30 billion. Since leaving corporate finance, as well as his civil society work, he has researched global citizenship, social justice and the political importance of cities at the London School of Economics, gaining a PhD in political philosophy, and spent two years as a civil servant as a Director of the Shareholder Executive in Whitehall.
